4:55 p.m. to download part of the recording for space issues and took a break. It is now 5:13 p.m., and we'll continue.

Q. Is that okay with you,
A. Yes.
Q. And, again, recognize that we appreciate your cooperation. And this is totally voluntary. I can't emphasize that enough. Do you understand?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay, before we took the pause here, I read the instructions from the Kansas City Proud Boys Chapter president. Do you recall who the president was at the time that sent this?
A. His online name That wasn't his real name, though. I do not recall it off the top of my head because I used $\square$ so regularly.
Q. Sure. And you provided this information to the FBI, correct?
A. Yes.
Q. How did you receive it?
A. Personal message.
Q. When you say personal message, does that mean a direct message?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay.
A. I don't know if others also received it from him. I didn't inquire.
Q. Did you respond to the Chapter president?
A. I believe I did, in regards to, you know, I'll make sure that others know this, too.
Q. Do you have copies of those communications?
A. Not with me. I shared as much as I could with
Q. And what -- to clarify, if you say not with you, does that mean you might have them elsewhere?
A. No, no. I, you know, you run out of space on your phone and like, well, I know I've sent that, so I start clearing out stuff I don't need. And to keep something like that on my phone, if someone else where to get a hold of it could compromise me. They'd be like, what are you doing with all this saved up?
Q. Okay. You were concerned that they would be suspicious why you would be storing all this information?
A. Yes.
Q. So, to the best of your memory, you received this directly. Are you aware of anyone else who received this message from the president?
A. I didn't inquire. I do not know.
Q. Did you share this information with anybody?
A. Yeah, anyone I talked to, it was like, remember, we got to be defense, you cannot be offensive, and stuff like that.
Q. When you say anyone you would talk to, would that be the individuals you were traveling with?
A. Yeah, individuals in the chat, but everyone was -there were a lot of people echoing the same things, so I don't know if it's because they had also gotten the same message or if it was just going without saying.
Q. Do you know whether Mr. Chrestman received this message?
A. I do not know.
Q. Do you know -- do you have any recollection of communicating with Mr. Chrestman regarding the message or the instructions from the president?
A. I do not remember.
Q. Do you have any recollection of discussing with Chris Kuehne the message from the president?
A. I don't remember.
Q. Do you remember discussing with Mr. Colon the message from the president?
A. I don't believe I would have. My communication with Mr. Colon was very limited and we'd only known each other briefly.
Q. Do you recall having any communication with Ryan Ashlock about the message from the president?
A. I do not recall.
Q. Did you have any communication?
A. If I did, the communication would have been like, do you have $\mathrm{X}, \mathrm{Y}$, and Z protective gear, and stuff like that.
Q. Now there is the thing in here about, the D.C. Chapter's requested that you not wear black and yellow. Do you recall any conversations with the folks you were traveling with about what to wear or what not to wear?
A. Just not to wear that. We were just going to try and blend in with a lot of other people and --
Q. The best of your ability, describe those -- that communication, or how that information was disseminated or discussed, if at all.
A. Could you -- I'm sorry, I got a little off track, could you reiterate?
Q. Absolutely. Just please tell us whatever you remember about discussions with anyone regarding what to wear.
A. I'm trying to recall why D.C. didn't want us to wear colors. I believe, matter of fact, I'm mostly sure now, that it was because they were already taking some heat. Especially in regards to the events of December. And so,
they didn't want to look like they were the ringleaders or orchestrating or planning, which they, they weren't. People were just going to go. And they were like, you guys, please, don't wear colors because they were -- there was already enough going on with, supposedly, the BLM banner hate crime charges and all that kind of stuff. So they were trying to mitigate any, you know, add on to all the legal stuff currently going on.
Q. And to be clear, is that your speculation as to why D.C. requested that?
A. I do not believe that's my speculation, I believe that's what I read elsewhere, I just can't recall the exact source. But I was like, oh, there's enough going on there. I get it. I'm just trying to rehash it as best I can.
Q. Do you recall having conversations with anybody that you were traveling with, regarding that the purpose of going was to be defensive or to fight Antifa?
A. As we were traveling out there, I don't believe we really talked much about that because it was already a given.


And a lot of that conversation I just
really had no input to. So I ended up Bluetooth-ing some of that time, finishing up an audio book and stuff like that.
Q. Would it be accurate to say you don't recall ever
passing along a written version of the president's instructions to anyone?
A. I did not create a written version, so I would not have passed a written version along.
Q. And do you recall any specific conversations with anyone -- anyone, period, about the fact that the purpose of attending the rally was -- or to go to D.C., was to defend others from Antifa or Black Lives Matter?
A. Say the question again.
Q. Do you recall having a conversation with anyone that you were traveling with?
A. I had no communication with the people in the other vehicle. And I do recall that I was having enough trouble keeping real names and faces straight with screen names that I was a little confused with who was in the other vehicle, as well, even though $I$ kind of had an idea who was going down. And as we left D.C., I ended up riding with William Chrestman, and he mentioned multiple times, well, you know, we were there to stop the steal. You know, I thought that's what we were there to do. And I was like, you know, that's not what I thought we were going to do, but that's what his takeaway was in the way he was rationalizing the previous day's events while we drove.
Q. And that was a conversation on the way back from the event?
A. Correct.
Q. And we'll follow up on that then. Prior to the event, did you have any communications -- let me be clear. Prior to the January 6th, did you have any communications with Mr. Chrestman about what the purpose was of going to D.C. on January 6th?
A. Any communications we had was about, you know, being there to protect the Trump supporters from attack.
Q. Do you recall having a specific conversation with him about that?
A. I do not recall. It could have been very light in the passing, which is why I don't recall, unless I stated something previously to $\square$ and I'm just not pulling it out of my memory bank at this time.
Q. Who was in the other car?
A. Chris Kuehne, Enrique Colon,
Q. Was Mr. Ashlock --
A. Ryan Ashlock.
Q. And let me just throw out the blanket question, do you recall any specific conversations with the individuals in the other car at any time regarding that the purpose of going to D.C. was to defend against Antifa or Black Lives
matter?
A. If I did, it would have been with Ryan Ashlock since they told me to put him under my wing just to try and reiterate that he was not supposed to be proactive in violence.
Q. Do you have a specific recollection of a conversation like that?
A. I do not have a specific one, but I could see that as, you know, hey, just make sure it's defensive, man. Something along those lines.
Q. Do you know who drafted this message from the president?
A. I assumed it was the president.
Q. Were you involved in drafting it?
A. No.
Q. Are you aware of any request from Proud Boys national leadership or other chapters that the Proud Boys not wear their Proud Boys colors or uniforms for January 6?
A. I'm not aware of anything additional, no.
Q. Did you --
A. And some Proud Boys do operate in chats and channels that $I$ am not in, mainly because $I$ didn't -- I don't know if they exist, or I may have looked at it briefly and said, yeah, there's too much for me to try and follow.
Q. Did you follow, or do you ever recall looking at
any social media accounts or Parler accounts for Enrique Tarrio?
A. I do not recall. I mean, I may have before Parler was originally taken down. I know I had followed a couple Proud Boy accounts in there at that time, but once Parler originally got taken down and was moved, that was months prior.
Q. And do you have any recollection of any communications in Mr. Tarrio's Parler or social media regarding what to do, or where, on January 6th?
A. No.
Q. And did you ever, to the best of your knowledge, ever access any social media accounts or Parler accounts for Joseph Biggs?
A. No.
Q. Okay. Any other members of national Proud Boys leadership social media or Parler accounts that you recall accessing?
A. No. And if in Enrique's house of propaganda, he had said something, sometimes when I get on a channel and there's over a hundred messages there, it's too much to read, so I'll just quickly go to the bottom and catch up on the most recent stuff. So I could have easily, you know, bypassed it as a result. I used to try to read, but then after a while, there's so many fart jokes and fag jokes and
everything else all the way down through it that, you know, it becomes redundant.
Q. So you left on January 4th; is that correct?
A. The evening, yes.
Q. At that point, was there a plan on where you were going to go in D.C.?
A. $\quad$ had reserved a house rental, kind of like Airbnb, but $I$ don't know if it was the same company.
Q. And did you have any information when you left to go to D.C. regarding where you -- what you were supposed to do on January 6?
A. No, just, you know, that it was going to be pretty much like December 12th, where were there during the day. Everyone's like, thank you for being here, et cetera, et cetera, because some of the people that had gone before had discussed this kind of stuff. And then that night, you know, be there for -- to protect Trump supporters and all. But that -- part of the reason why we were not wearing colors is because of all the aggression that had happened that night in actively going out and them looking for Antifa and challenging them at BLM Park and all that stuff with cops dividing, and how that -- we were encouraged not to be proactive in such things.
Q. By who?
A. Everyone in general, because of legal stuff
already going on with hate crime charges for the BLM banner and stuff like that.
Q. When you say, everyone in general, what do you mean?
A. Well, higher ups in the Proud Boys in Kansas City.
Q. Okay.
A. Just to be a little more specific, they didn't want us, you know, being in a situation where if someone ripped down a banner, any of our guys would get in trouble. They didn't say those words explicitly, but they were telling us to scale back and not make it like last time.
Q. Is that in addition to the written instructions or apart from the written instructions that you received?
A. That was outside of the written instructions, just making sure everyone played it safe.
Q. And where did you get that information?
A. There was a meta. Um, let's see. Where was a meet-up. Let's see, where was it?

Q. Who was present for that?
A. A lot of guys, but the president was there for that one, of Kansas City. And, you know, he had, you know, guys be safe, don't be stupid, stuff like that. And so his written instructions were close to what he was saying that day, actually. And I'm just actually recalling that of -that night now, as a direct result of our conversations.
Q. And who from the two carloads of people that traveled to Washington, D.C., from Kansas City attended the meeting you just described?
A. I can't say specifically. I know a few of them were there, not like Ryan Ashlock or anything like that. I don't recall Enrique being there either. Trying to remember the specific --
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But there -- yeah, there was a -
Q. Do you have a specific recollection of William Chrestman being there?
A. I don't want to confuse it with other nighttime events.
Q. Sure.
A. I may end up doing that.
Q. And that's why the question is a specific recollection.
A. I can't say I have a specific recollection.
Q. Do you have a specific recollection of

Chris Kuehne being at the meeting you described?
A. I can't say I do. It's -- because I'm just remembering that there was that we meet-up and it was just a, you know, it was just prior, right before we went out to

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do recall, though, that there was one event right before that where guys got together to drink, and it was at that location, and it was prior to heading out.
Q. Do you recall how soon before heading out?
A. Within that two-week window and all that. And I think there was a period where $I$ wasn't sure $I$ was going to go, but on the -- by the 29th, that's when I was going.

Trying to get -- because I know it happened there, now, and I'm like, wait a minute, so what date did that happen on, but I hadn't thought about it since that time. So --
Q. So it's my understanding that on January 6, you ended up meeting at the Washington Monument at 10 a.m.; is that correct?
A. Yeah.
Q. And however, prior to leaving for D.C., was there -- were you aware of a plan of where to meet, or who
you would be meeting with in Washington, D.C.?
A. No, I thought (indiscernible). And so, I was like, okay, so what are we doing? And we -- others thought, oh, well, we'll be right outside Harry's and that's the normal meet up place. So we're there for a while. It's like, where is everyone else at? And that's when I started reaching out to the president.
Q. So you were unaware of any specific, even logistics for the rally itself; is that correct?
A. Correct. And the president thought we had gotten there a day before and that we had been around all the other stuff. And so, we knew the information that we had, and we were still on the road.
Q. You recall any discussions? You mentioned bringing in protective equipment. Were there any discussions about bringing radios?
A. It would -- I do recall that briefly. to discuss radios and stuff like that. But none of us had stuff like that, just that, you know, we would reach out to each other via the Telegram channel. If you get lost, say, hey, this is where I'm at.
Q. Did you ever radio?
A. No, I did not have a radio.
Q. Do you know of any others from the two carloads of individuals we discussed, who had a radio?
A. At that time, no. I believe at the December 12th, there was some guys that had a radio, and they were listening in that day, you know, trying to catch, you know, what Antifa was planning. But I am not aware of January 6. I mean, we had hardly any sleep and all that, and went out bright and early. We figured as long as everyone stuck together and did what they said, we wouldn't have a need for radios.
Q. So now the two carloads of folks that are going out -- or the group from Kansas City, is there a leader of that group?
A. I don't believe that there was a leader. I mean, up until he backed out, you know, seemed to be organizing it more, and more in tune for everything. But afterwards, no, because that's why the night before, as we were coming in, we found out that Chris Kuehne had gone to the store to get tape, so that way we could help make sure we, we kept an eye on each other so we wouldn't get mixed up, because there had been talk that Antifa would be trying to blend in and dress like, you know, MAGA supporters and everything else, just trying to blend in. And so, they had, before we got to D.C., Chris Kuehne's vehicle decided that it'd be a smart idea to get some highly visible tape, duct tape, and be able to put that on some of our guys to help us spot each other. So if there's a defensive situation, the
wrong guy doesn't end up getting hurt.
Q. How did you learn that?
A. It was as we were coming into D.C., one of -- I think it was had mentioned that briefly through their -- talking with someone else, I don't know who, but I was in the back seat, and it seemed to -- yeah, I recall it coming from And I was like, well, that's cool, because, you know, we had briefly talked about it ourselves. Like, I wonder if we need something that can help us identify each other and all that and found out that they were already doing it. And so, it was still, you know, at that point, yeah, the fact that none of us were, you know, had already pre thought that, shows that we were kind of leaderless on stuff. I mean, $\square$ would talk a good game, though.
Q. Who was the most senior Proud Boy from the Kansas City group that went out?
A.
Q. Where do you think you fell? If you and Mr. Chrestman both got your seconds on the same day.
A. Right in there. I mean, you know, I'm a nice, easy-to-get-along-with guy, so people would talk to me, you know, friendly, like, but I'm not the bark-orders-at-anyone
kind of type. I think that everyone was listening to anyone with former military experience more than me because they had more knowledge on how to be organized and move together. There was talk about going through the crowd and resting one hand on each shoulder, so we did get separated in crowds, and all that, as we just freely moved about in a nonviolent situation.
Q. Who talked about that?
A. I do not recall, but I do recall it being mentioned that night in the living room.
Q. Okay, and we'll get to the discussions that evening. Now, before we get to the actual travel to D.C., did the FBI request you to travel to D.C. for the January 6 event?
A. They didn't request. I just, you know, I'd seen the call, well, if you find out they're going, let me know. I found out they were going and said, I'm going to go along with them.
Q. Okay, so whose decision was it for you to go to the January 6 event?
A. I don't even believe I even got any money to go with from you all on that, because it was so quick, so it would have had to have been my decision to go.
Q. And as part of this trip, other than the general tasking of reporting on violence in general, were you asked
to do anything with regard to the Proud Boys on this trip?
A. I do not recall specific instructions on that. I was just, you know, going to -- if I observe something and I could report on a crime, that's what I do. And --
Q. But to be clear, did the FBI ask you to do anything with regard to the Proud Boys on this trip?

I do not recall that. Just originally, let us know if they're going to go. That's it.
Q. Okay. Were you given any authorization to break the (indiscernible) on this trip?
A. No. And I don't believe we would have even had time to get something like that to go through. Yeah, so --
Q. You said you left on January 4th,

D Do you recall the route you took?
A. We took I-70 East for a long, long, long, long time.
Q. And I may make this easier. Do you recall going through Lexington on your way to D.C.?
A. It does ring a bell, Kentucky, yeah, because I believe it was east of there that we got a hotel for the night.
Q. Did you meet with others in or around the Lexington area? I do not recall doing that. And I think we tried to say, hey, where y'all stopping off at. And they're like, eh, we're stopping here. And we only got a few hours
of sleep because we got in really late.
Q. So you didn't meet up with other groups traveling to D.C.?
A. No, we would see vehicles occasionally.
Q. Okay.
A. And they were like normal Trump supporters with flags hanging off their cars and stuff. But I do not recall instances where we tried to communicate with them.
Q. You left on the 4th. You spent the night. When did you arrive in D.C.?
A. The evening of the 5th. It was dark. I can't recall the exact time, maybe 7:00-ish. Maybe 8:00-ish. I could have been earlier, though, because winter, I mean, it gets dark earlier.
Q. Are you aware of anyone in your car who brought any weapons with them to D.C.?
A. In my car, $I$ do not recall anyone bringing a weapon.
Q. Did you have a weapon?
A. No, and I was actually given some pepper spray by Chris Kuehne the morning of January 6 because I didn't have a weapon.
Q. Did you have a knife with you?
A. I don't recall. If I did, it was just, you know, normal, like something you have -- I have one in the door of
my car right now and all that --
Q. What kind of knife?
A. Just a small little one that folds out. I do not recall if I had it with me that day, though. Oh, no, because I would have -- there was a lot of talk about making sure you don't bring something that could definitely get you in trouble, whereas pepper spray is, you know, definitely that could be a self-defense thing from, you know, a mob, like, you know, some -- or not mob, but, you know, let's say someone's going out to their car and someone tries to rob them on the way. It would be normal to have pepper spray.
Q. So when you arrived in D.C. -- so, just to clarify that, to the best of your knowledge, you don't recall whether you brought a knife to D.C.?
A. I do not recall having a knife with me inside D.C.
Q. So when you arrived in the D.C. area, you went to the Airbnb that had rented. Is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. Who else was staying there?
A. Both carloads, stopped by with his friends briefly. And then they left because they had accommodations elsewhere.
Q. Okay. So that, just to be clear, was

Mr. Chrestman, Kuehne, Colon, Ashlock, and you, and
A. Yes, to the best of my knowledge, that's all who was there. I don't believe there was anyone else.
Q. Were you involved in going to Home Depot to get any supplies?
A. No.
Q. Are you aware of anyone going to Home Depot to get supplies?
A. Chris Kuehne and one other person in his vehicle, I'm -- maybe, two. I'm not aware of who they were.
Q. Did they go while -- after you had arrived in D.C. or before?
A. They got back to the house from Home Depot after we had arrived.
Q. Okay, and do you know what, if anything, they went and got?
A. Duct tape, orange fluorescent color.
Q. Do you recall Mr. Colon got an axe -- or an axe handle? I'm sorry.
A. I do not recall that.
Q. Do you know if anyone else went to the Home Depot to get any type of weapons, or any place to get any type of weapons, including an axe handle?
A. I do not recall, but $I$ know that William Chrestman carried an ax handle that day. I thought he had brought it
with him. He arrived -- sorry, three vehicles -- he arrived separately in his own jeep.
Q. Oh, Chrestman did?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay, so he drove separately?
A. Which is why I left separately with him,



Q. So if I just could clarify, I appreciate your clarification. So William Chrestman drove alone, to the best of your knowledge, to D.C.? Is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. Chris Kuehne, Enrique Colon, Ryan Ashlock, and
$\square$ drove together?
A. Yes.
Q.

A.
Q. And who drove the car that

A. Chris Glen (ph.). It was his truck.
Q. Chris Kuehne or -- Chris Kuehne.
A. Chris Kuehne, yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. Sorry, the Colon, Q (indiscernible) --
Q. Approximately what time did you get into the D.C. area on January 5th?
A. It could have been as early as 6:00 or as late as 8:00.
Q. Okay, So it was evening?
A. Yeah, it was definitely dark at the time.
Q. And what was going on at the house that evening?
A. People were talking about food, getting a bite to eat or something like that, and that the other guys were not there right now because they had run to the store, the Home Depot. And so we pretty much just brought in some of our stuff and put it where we were going to sleep of. I don't recall at which point Billy arrived, if he arrived before us or after. Or William Chrestman, sorry, Billy was (indiscernible).
Q. And then other than and whoever was with him coming by the house, did anybody else come by the house that evening?
A. Not to my recollection. I do not recall.
Q. And what was going on at the house? Drinking, partying, eating, resting, anything?
A. Eating, and then talking about, you know, what -- it got -- the guys with military experience were putting in their two cents about how to stay safe, stay
away, how to move as a group. So that way, you know, we didn't get lost when we didn't need to because then, you know, if you get separated, you could get hurt. And how will anyone else know, that kind of talk.
Q. Was there any discussion, to the best of your recollection, about the election?
A. Some, yes. I don't recall who, but I mean, it was all, you know, I mean, it's the whole point of the rally. So of course, some of the topic went around that.
Q. And that was a bad question. I'll come back to that. Did anybody -- was there any formality to this get together? For example, did people address the group or give introductions or anything like that?
A. If in regards to, well, I used to be the military and $I$ did $X, Y$, and $Z$, and from, you know, when it comes to a situation like this, this is something we need to, you know, think about, and keep in our minds and that kind of thing, like when $\square$ was talking, and all.
Q. Okay, but was there any discussion about -- other than tactically, how to defend the group or keep the group safe, were there any other discussions about what specifically the group was going to do the next day?
A. We're going to wake up at this time. We're going to -- some of the guys had already plotted out where we're going to get onto the subway transit system to get into the
area, and it's going to be real busy, so we're going to want to go early, and everything. And make sure you don't bring any weapons, because $I$ know some of them did have guns. Like Enrique Colon had brought a gun. And I believe Chris Kuehne had a -- Bill or William Chrestman had mentioned about having brought a gun. And I was like, I do recall at one point thinking, I could have sworn they had something that when you drove into D.C., it could, like, x-ray your car, see if you had guns there and all that. And I'm like, or maybe that's just, you know, something I read that they were talking about doing that. You know, I recall thinking along those lines, and all.
Q. Were -- other than the logistics of when to get up and how to travel to the downtown, were there any other discussions about what the group was actually going to do the next day?
A. We were just kind of winging it and waiting to meet up with the rest of the Proud Boys.
Q. Okay. Was there any discussion about doing anything at the Capitol?
A. No.
Q. Was there any discussion about doing anything to do -- with regard to the election?
A. No, just, you know, the normal, yeah, you pause the vote middle of the night, then the numbers change. That
kind of thing.
Q. So no, you know, no discussion about taking action as a result of that; is that correct?
A. No, and it wasn't until the day after, on January 7th, that Billy even made comments like, I thought that's what we were there to do.
Q. So he wasn't making comments like that, that evening?
A. No.
Q. Did anyone in the group indicate they wanted to use force or violence against anyone other than Antifa and Black Lives Matter?
A. No.
Q. Okay. And you mentioned you -- or that Enrique Colon had a gun with him. How did you learn that?
A. Because on January 6th, when we got back to the house after that day's events, he was real nervous. He had had family come from a nearby military base or something and pick him up. And Chris Kuehne made the comment that he left his gun behind, with him, along with some boots and stuff.
Q. Do you know if Mr. Colon brought the gun with him to the march?
A. I do not know. I mean, the fact that it was left in the truck and the truck did transport people means that he could have had it there. But I do not have specific
knowledge about that.
Q. And I think you mentioned that Chris Kuehne had a gun, too.
A. Yeah.
Q. How did you know that?
A. Just random mentions, you know, about, you know, because of safety and everything like that. Like, you know what if it's hard getting out of D.C. because of Antifa and everything like that.
Q. So how is that how the gun came up?
A. Yes, actually, because someone joked, it's like, man, what if they start putting up roadblocks and stuff like they do in some places and all. And it's like, you know, we've got a few guns. We can -- I'm sure we can get our way to safety.
Q. Do you know what kind of gun he had with him?
A. I do not know. I do know, though, that at one point during our conversation, it had been mentioned that Chris Kuehne was capable for parts and all that, of building someone -- if they would ever request it and could legally own one, a BOF . 50 cal for right around $\$ 800$. And I was like, hmm, well, if you want to go hunting an elephant.
Q. Do you know if Mr. Kuehne brought the guns with him to the rally?
A. I do not know.
Q. And then you mentioned Chrestman had a gun. How did you learn that?
A. He mentioned it in the jeep right on the way back.
Q. Do you know if he had it with him at the rally?
A. I do not know.
Q. And are you aware of anybody else from the group having any firearms?
A. I am not aware of it.

want to move to January 6th itself. You indicated that there had been discussion of about when to get up. So approximately -- describe for me how you all then got to D.C.
A. We took two vehicles and parked in a parking garage, at which point, shortly after exiting the garage, we made our way to the entrance of the subway system where some of us had to buy cards. I don't remember which person
hadn't prepared for that, but someone had to buy a card for another person in the group. And that way, you know, we'd have our passes for the day. And then it was about figuring out which train we had -- or subway we had to get on to get into that area.
Q. What time did you all leave the house approximately?
A. I would say around 4:30, 5:00.
Q. Do you know who -- how the decision came to leave so early?
A. We were thinking about crowds, but it wasn't my decision. It was just, you know, it's going to be really packed. And sure enough, that morning when we got there, there were already people trickling down the sidewalk with Trump shirts and flags and all that, and it only increased from then on.
Q. Did -- so would you say it was a consensus as opposed to an individual saying we will leave at this time?
A. The drivers were the ones making the plans in general.
Q. Okay.
A. Basically, the guys who -- at that point, anyone with military background, they had already, you know, they're the ones that instruct the group how we go and --
Q. And who in the group had military backgrounds?
A. and Chrestman, Chris Kuehne that I know of.
Q. Was it your impression that they were responsible for any of the tactical planning?
A. They had more experience, so any tactical planning did come from them.
Q. So once you got downtown into D.C., it's my understanding you then went to Harry's Bar.
A. Yes.
Q. And why was that location chosen?
A. Because that tends to be where Proud Boys like to hang out. And that's where everyone was on December 12th for the MAGA rally. But that wasn't where they were this time.
Q. Okay. So once you arrived at Harry's Bar, at some point, did you get -- did somebody get instructions as to what you were supposed to do that day?
A. We were there for a while first. And then we're like, maybe we should walk around and look around, look for other people. And while we were doing that, we decided we were going to head back to Harry's Bar, and maybe people are, you know, getting there now. Maybe we were just early. At that time, on our way back there, is when we first encountered the militia guy from Colorado, and he is like, are you all militia? We're like, no, we're Proud Boys. He goes, oh, I'm with the Colorado militia. I'm kind of alone
right now. Can I just walk around with you all for a bit and all that? And I'm like, yeah, but once we get up with the rest of our Proud Boys, you can't really hang inside. But I don't think anyone policed that the rest of the day. And he pretty much did his own thing from that point on.
Q. Do you -- were you involved with the decision to allow the militia guy to hang out with you guys, or how did that happen?
A. It was just we didn't care. We were just polite. I remember he came up to -- and asked me, and I think at that point I was surrounded by a bunch of them, and everybody -- I don't recall being the one to give the, yes, you may absolutely, you know -- but I think it was like, yeah, until we meet the other Proud Boys or something like that, you know, just so he'd have someone to hang out -someone to hang out with. Then that's when we were told that others, the Ozark Chapter guys were down there, and they didn't know what to do. And so we were -- we arranged to go meet up with them.
Q. Let me take a pause here. Before this point -- I forget, and I know we talked about this -- before this point, were you aware that you were going -- you were supposed to meet up with the Ozark people? Or was that --
A. I was not aware at that time.
Q. So at some point then, after you met the Colorado
guy, you then learned -- is this when your president reached out to you to say, there's these Ozark guys? Can you meet up with them?
A. Yes. And so, we arranged to go meet them at, like, what is that area called? Freedom Square or something like that? Or Freedom Park? And then there's a block just off to the side, and it was counter corner -- that corner that faced the Washington Monument is the one where we met up with the man. We were told to look for the blue beanie and all that.
Q. And were you doing the direct messaging with the blue beanie guy?
A. Yes, I was doing the direct messaging.
Q.
A.
Q. So if I can recap, you get to D.C., you go to Harry's, you then decide to look around for others. You run into the Colorado guy, you go back to Harry's, you then go meet up with the Ozark guys. And then do you go back to Harry's or you then go to -- what do you do next?
A. We then started heading back to Harry's and all. And it was either on the way back to Harry's or after Harry's when we finally got our chapter president to reach out and find out where others were, that we ran into Felicia

Konold and her brother, who were like, who are you all. And like, Proud Boys. Like, oh, cool, and all this stuff. What are you doing? We're just going to go meet up with some people. Can we walk with you al since we're here alone? People tend to feel safer in groups, and a lot of people, you know, were constantly like, you know, would -- like when we were there in December, and they could tell we were Proud Boys, people were always walking up telling us how glad we were there for them and all that. So you know, it's like, sure, but once we get up with the other Proud Boys, you're not going to be able to walk in amongst them. And even once everyone organized up, it was called out that, you know, if you're not a Proud Boy, you got to walk in the back.
Q. So who interacted with Ms. Konold and her brother, with regard to, you can walk with us, and (indiscernible)?
A. William Chrestman was in communication with her. And it was like they all, like, were right there with each other the whole day from that -- from the initial meet.
Q. So --
A. And some of us joked, it's like, think Billy kind of likes her, you know.
Q. So was it you then, at one point, that reached out to the president to say, hey, what's the plan?
A. Well, he had -- that's when the president said, I thought you guys were already there, and knew. And we were
like, no, we weren't here yesterday for when Enrique got released and all that. And so he had to reach out and then said, they're going to be at the Washington Monument at 10:00. Find this guy, let them know you made it there.
Q. And this was a direct message to you from the president?
A. Yes.
Q. And was it your understanding, then that these instructions had been given to others who were there when Enrique had been released?
A. When -- yeah, when Enrique had been released, all the other Proud Boys that were already there knew where to meet up the next day.
Q. That was your understanding?
A. Yes.
Q. And do you recall who you were instructed to check in with at the monument?
A. I do not recall his name. It was an odd street name. He was a very -- guy could have been Samoan, could have been half black. Very big. I think he might have had one tooth with like some gold trim around it. I may be wrong on that. But I mean, if I was to encounter him elsewhere, like in a normal street and all that stuff, I'd think he, you know -- just that first appearance had like some thuggish context, how he looked.
Q. So you got the information from the president. I assume you then conveyed that to the rest of the group. Hey, we've got to go to the Washington Monument. Would that be fair to say?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay.
A. And as we were walking up, there was a large group there that were in military fatigues and everything. And as we were walking up, one of the guys gave the okay symbol, but very discreetly, like that. And a couple of us returned it to let him know that, yeah, we're Proud Boys approaching and all. But I don't think he was told to do that, he was probably just checking, are these other Proud Boys coming up.
Q. Do you know who it was?
A. No, just a random in the crowd he saw. Someone was like -- and we returned and kept going up.
Q. So once you get to the monument, you've checked in, what happens next?
A. Hours of standing around.
Q. Okay. Of standing around at the monument?
A. Yeah.
Q. Okay.
A. And every now and then someone would walk by and say, whoa, look at the size of this militia. I'm like,
they're not a militia. They're Proud Boys. You know, and stuff like that. The Arizona guy showed up. I remember them because they all had really bright orange safetycolored beanies on. And, you know, I was like, oh, what chapter you from? We're from Arizona. Oh, yeah, Kansas City. You know, that was it, just typical politeness and -but no real in-depth conversation or anything like that.
Q. Okay. Standing -- then at some point the -- I take it the group moved at some point?
A. Yeah, then the guy in glasses from previous pictures began shouting out some orders and saying that, as we walk, none of you will walk past the leaders. The leaders must be in front, and you will keep pace with us. We will pause every now and then for pictures. Make sure you do not cross in front of all this. Make sure you're listening, and we will never again come to one of these not wearing our colors.
Q. And how -- was he using a bullhorn or was he just yelling, or what do you recall about that?
A. I, I thought he was yelling. I don't recall off the top of my head enough, I'd never given much thought to trying to remember that instance. I don't recall seeing bullhorns in people's hands.
Q. Was there any organization of how people lined up behind the leaders?
A. No.
Q. Do you recall anybody else giving instructions other than the guy in sunglasses?
A. One other guy might have shouted something, but the guy in sunglasses was the predominant. He was actually, you know, the -- if anyone seemed to be in charge, it would have been him.
Q. Okay. Now you said somebody may have shouted something. Do have a recollection of that?
A. No. More like, shut up, listen up, kind of stuff like that.
Q. Okay. And as you've already said, you didn't actually have direct contact with that individual in the sunglasses. Is that correct?
A. Correct.
Q. Okay, so you said you would be walking around and stopping for pictures, had to line up behind leadership. And so that I take it you then -- the group started walking; is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. Were there any discussions at the monument about what the plan was other than walking around?
A. No, because I recall even thinking to myself as I was walking and we were chanting, fuck Antifa, and whose streets, our streets -- and as we were doing the walking, I
remember thinking, what are they gonna do, walk us all day and expect us to be able to defend against Antifa at night. And, you know, I'm like, my boots are really making my feet sore. They weren't broken in. It was horrible experience and I'll never wear combat boots again. But so, yeah, there was a lot of -- at some point, as we're walking through, we're like, I hope they walk us past some food trucks. I'm kinda hungry because -- so and that was from some random stranger in the crowd. He said it loud enough that he got some giggles, and someone else, walk us past the porta potties, you know? And then they'd say, halt, some pictures, continue. And then when we got to the end of another patch of grass, halt, pictures, continue. And someone would get down and film us walking by from the bottom up and everything like that. And, you know, one of those odd avant-garde angles or whatever, you know, just a bunch of that. And when we finally got to some kind of a water fountain thing at the base of the Capitol, outside the barriers and all that, we had to pause for a photo there, too. And then he walked us around into the other side of the Capitol. And people were like, who are you all. And we're like, fuck Antifa, not whose streets -- and people are like, oh, those are Proud Boys. Can we come too? And I think William Chrestman went and talked to the guy in the sunglasses and asked about the other people, was told they
have to walk at the back of us. They cannot walk amongst us.
Q. Did Chrestman know the guy in sunglasses, was your understanding?
A. No. But a lot of people kept mistaking Chrestman for Gavin McInnes. And so it was almost like some people were naturally giving him a leadership role, even though he was not involved. And so he walked up, say, hey, (indiscernible). They got to stay at the back and, you know --
Q. Okay.
A. And at that point, it was like --
Q. And you learned that from Chrestman?
A. Yes.
Q. They were told that they have to stay in the back. Is that correct?
A. Yeah, that he had gone and asked for the people who had saw us on the front side of the Capitol and wanted to walk with us. So we'll start out with -- our group had grown up, and all that. Kept increasing in size.
Q. And at some point, you guys stop at the food trucks; is that correct?
A. Yes. After we came back down. And I remember thinking to myself, how I had to tell people they could join with us only to come down here and then disperse for food,
you know?
Q. Do you recall anything -- so when you guys broke at the food trucks, were there any instructions, or how did you guys get back together, or anything like that?
A. They were just like, all right, come on guys, line up. You know, just the general shouts like that. I don't recall what was specifically said, but we all got back together again.
Q. And up to this point, were you aware of anybody engaging in any discussions about doing anything at the Capitol?
A. No.
Q. So then from the food trucks -- and during this break, (indiscernible) -- from the food trucks, you then begin walking again. Is that correct?
A. Yes, it was a much shorter walk. I had a chance to take some ibuprofen, which started to take the edge off of my soreness. And we walked back towards the Capitol on the side where the inauguration was going to go. And we were on a side street in front of it. We weren't facing directly, but we were like, you know, like, a left to right angle. I can't recall if we were facing south or facing north because a little turned around, you know, hadn't been there that often. But the Washington Monument would have been to our right many patches of grass away. And so we
were standing there, and we weren't even in front of the main stairs leading up and all that. And I remember watching a large crowd of Trump supporter flags and people walking up and everything, and they all get up there to the front and all that. And I'm hearing that Trump said, you know, let's walk to the Capitol or something. And then I saw people start going up the steps, and I said, I thought there were barriers there. And, oh, they just knocked down the barriers, at which point --
Q. Let me stop you here. So you guys were paused there in front of the barriers for a while; is that correct?
A. Yes, but just off to the side of them, not directly in front.
Q. And what --
A. Well, but I was far enough back, to me, it appeared we were not directly in front of them.
Q. Sure. While the group was stopped there, do you recall anybody discussion -- any discussions among the group or period about taking the Capitol, going into the grounds, anything like that before the barrier came down?
A. No, none. Just chanting 1776 and stuff like that. And fuck Antifa, and whose streets, our street, as the Trump crowd approached.
Q. So would it be fair to say that your first understanding that people were going to enter the Capitol
grounds is when you saw individuals going through the barrier?
A. When I saw people going up the stairs.
Q. Towards the barrier?
A. The barrier at the lower level had already been breached. And I said, that's when I was like, I thought there had been a barrier there. And then someone else said, they just took out the barrier. I was like, oh. And which leads me back to William Chrestman's comment about how we started this, that I had mentioned earlier.
Q. Sure. Recognizing that there is lots of people and lots of action going on, what's your best recollection as to -- from the point you saw the barriers going down to you actually going through the barriers?
A. I had messaged him first saying, Proud Boys didn't do this because at that time $I$ thought it was that wave of Trump supporters walking up, and that they had just gone right through.
Q. So -- and let me pause there because you raised a point $I$ wanted to get to. So I got a copy of these messages and I've highlighted -- because they are duplicative of highlighted the section so that it would read in order as opposed to the duplicative language. If you would just go ahead and take a, take a look at that. And my question will be, are your texts the ones that are on the left side of the
screen?
A. Yes.
Q. Okay.
A. PB did not do it, nor inspire -- I didn't remember the inspired part. Yeah.
Q. So and then -- oh, go ahead. Please go ahead and read through to refresh your memory.
A. (Mumbling and reading to himself.) Nobody here knows what you're referring to. What happened. Yeah, how would you know at that point? (Mumbling and reading to himself.) Safe. Okay. Tired. KCPB helped to be -- and this was very -- this was later after that.
Q. Okay, so I want to go through the -- oh, go ahead, if you want to keep reading.
A. Yeah. Okay.
Q. So, again, and this is why I emphasized I recognize that there's lots of things going on. The text to the FBI, which says PB did not do it, nor inspire the crowd. It is a herd mentality, not organized, reads January 6, 12:02 p.m.
A. I thought it happened later in the day.
Q. Well, I would assume that this was, 2:00 p.m. Central Time, because that was the --
A. No, your phone resets automatically to the time zone you're in. Well --
Q. But this was --

UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: (Indiscernible) from him. CONFIDENTIAL SOURCE: Oh, yes.

I'll make the representation that
this is the version that was received by the agent who was in the Central Time Zone.

CONFIDENTIAL SOURCE: Yes. So it had been right around 1:00.

BY
Q. How strong -- I'm sorry. Where were you when you sent this text? And this is very important, so I --
A. Still in that group here. When I said the first -- those first few moments, I was still there and like two thirds back in the group of Proud Boys as people were starting to go up the stairs and everything like that. I immediately texted. But that's because from my point of view, it looked like it had happened by the Trump supporters. William Chrestman, with his own words, gave me other information later. And I don't know if he -- and I believe Chrestman was referring to the first barrier. Don't know if he was referencing others at the time.
Q. Okay, I'm going to show you and let you watch along with me here. This is the R.M.G. video starting at 1 minute, 49 seconds. And I just want to get confirmation as to the timing here. I'm going to push play. Here's an
individual who's crossing in front of the screen at one minute, 53 seconds in, with a black baseball cap, an olive or green vest with a yellow tab, and then --
A. That is Chrestman.
Q. -- what appears to be either a bat -- a piece of wood with blue on the front. Is that -- you said that's Mr. Chrestman?
A. Yes, that is definitely Mr. Chrestman right in the front.
Q. And then I'm going to pause at 1:57.
A. This is a different set of barriers, I believe.

This -- I don't think this was the ones closest to -- wait a minute.
Q. These, these are -- this video is of the first set of barriers.
A. All right.
Q. Unless there's another set of barriers. But this is the one that is the first that becomes breached. Here, I'll show you. So 1:57, I paused. Actually, and just let me clarify. And as I told you, this is not (indiscernible).
A. Because I remember that there was a -- I remember there was the batch down below, then there was another set midway.
Q. And there's going to be another set that we'll get to. So --
A. Yeah.
Q. And just to clarify, 1:57, it appears that you're going across the barrier. Is that correct?
A. Yes. At that point, $I$ was just like, all right, just observe and report. Don't -- I kept telling myself, don't get wrapped up in this. Don't get drawn in by the energy. Observe and report.
Q. It is your recollection, as you said, that you texted the agent prior to this occurring; is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. How strong is your recollection on that? Or I can phrase it this way, how positive are you that you texted the agent before going through the barricade?
A. You're actually causing doubt in my head now, so -- what time is that?
Q. I don't have a specific time on -- actually, let me see something real quick.

UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: So how far back does that video go?

I'll show you. I do believe it shows the beginning of the breach.

BY
Q. So just to let you -- it's our understanding that
this barrier went down about 12:53 or 12:54 p.m. Your text would be at 1:02 p.m. Again, you're the person who knows when you sent the text or not. But, yeah, I'll back this up so you can get a better perspective of this barrier. And you're going to appear here, momentarily. I think once the cameraman gets closer.
A. It's the -- they're already going through it.
Q. They're not through yet.
A. Oh, they're not?
Q. They're pressing up against -- the video shows that -- will show that they're pressing up closer to the barrier.
A. So this is the second barrier, I thought the first barrier down below, I thought there was a first barrier right there at the street that ran left and right. This would be what I had previously believed to be the second, which would be why my thinking, I thought there was a barrier there, when I saw people going up.
Q. So let me --

UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: Because the first barrier was
a street, right?
This is the street --
UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: This is the street?
This is the street barrier.
CONFIDENTIAL SOURCE: No, because what was that,
what was that concrete thing then that people were walking past --

UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: The statue?
BY
Q. It's a statue. There -- and I'll show you. I can show you that, here. So this is what is known as the first street. Because they're --
A. No, because the street's out here further. That's a longer walkway up there, right?
Q. This is a longer walkway, and I'm going to show you there's going to be another barrier you get stopped at.
A. I remember I was in the crowd at -- when I texted, but --
Q. So there's you. I'm at 4:40.
A. That would have been my recollection of a third barrier. Where's me?
Q. Is that correct? That's you, and I'm gonna --
A. Yeah, all the way up here where this is, I thought that was the third barrier.
Q. Okay.
A. So my understanding of the barriers is wrong.
Q. Okay. So let me let me phrase it this way. At the time you sent the text, how strong is your recollection, just your recollection or your understanding at the time, that a barrier had already been breached when you entered --
A. I wouldn't have sent the text if a barrier hadn't been breached already.
Q. Of course. I'm sorry. Let me -- that was a poor -- poor way of phrasing the question. I should say it this -- how sure -- how -- do you know whether you had already breached the barrier yourself before sending the text message?
A. I'm unsure now.
Q. Okay.
A. I -- that has brought into question some of my -what I had perceived to be my memory at the time. But there was a lot going on, and I wasn't used to being in a stressful situation like this, so I could see where I would make a mistake. And is it possible that I though, oh, I'm going to have to let them know that $I$ was going along and then I was late at sending it, and I'm going off of when I first thought about contacting -- that -- I will give that is a possibility now. But before this moment, I wouldn't have thought that.
Q. Sure. And, actually, I'm going to play from 4:40, just a little bit forward. And it appears to be the individual with the sunglasses. Did you see him at -- did you -- I think we've seen the picture of this individual before with the, with the black winter cap --
A. I'm not sure who that is.
Q. -- here. So now at 4:33, we see the individual with the sunglasses drinking a canned beverage. Is that correct?
A. Yeah, you do.
Q. And then there's another individual --
A. Yes, I do recall walking up briefly and looking around, but I also recall falling back away from it, though, being like about 20 or 30 feet back right before the steps went down and trying to hang out in that area. And that's where I had spotted Chrestman on the far right before the flash bangs and tried to ask him to, hey, why don't you come hang out in the back. And I even said the same thing to Ryan Ashlock, who was hanging out in the middle, and who said, nah, I'm cool, I'm not getting into anything. And then I had to go and pull him away from there because I saw him like this at one point. And he had been pepper gassed at that point and pulled him to the back where we poured water in his eyes.
Q. Let me -- I want to show you around 4:50. There's a fixed metal barrier in front of the crowd here, and it looks like the individual with sunglasses and the individual with glasses in the black winter cap will start rocking or trying to move that barrier. Do you have any recollection of that or being involved with that at all?
A. I do not recall that one. I remember that there
was one further back which I would refer -- which my memory perceived to be the second barrier. And some -- I think it was a girl, had kicked it at one point and I reached forward and grabbed and tried to pull it back. And I'm like, this is -- I'm not going to be able to stand this back up. And I said, and $\square$ if you get your hand -- I shouldn't have said that on the tape. I was like, if you're even seen with your hands on it, it can be taken so out of context. So don't. You know? And so I tried to remind myself to not touch barriers anymore after that, because it was -- I guess a human leg is much stronger than human arms. And there was no undoing that -- what that person had done when they kicked it. Because they had kicked it forward and I tried to pull it back a little bit. And then I stopped and said, nope, stop it,
Q. Okay. So it's accurate to say at this point, you're not sure if you sent the text message to the agent before or after you went past the barrier; is that correct?
A. That's correct.
Q. And is it correct to say either way, the FBI did not authorize -- did not -- had not given you permission to enter the Capitol grounds?
A. It is correct to say that. I, I had thought to myself briefly, well, why would they want me to go along, witness, observe, and report if stuff happened, or would
they want me to stay out? And I was like, you know, if I stay out, they'll be like, well, you know, we would have been -- I thought they would have been okay. Our conversations since then has confirmed that my thinking was in error.
Q. Okay.
A. So I went with altruistic intentions.

BY UNIDENTIFIED AGENT:
Q. Just did you -- you did not receive direction from anybody at the FBI about reporting at that point, correct?
A. No, it was just if I witness things happening, I was going to report them anyways.
Q. And from that -- we mention that a lot. And so when was that -- like, when did you get that kind of instruction. Was it kind of a standing thing or --
A. Just a standing thing. Like, if I go hang out with some Proud Boys and I see one of them throw a rock and break a window by accident, and everyone runs, I was going to report it. You know? You know, like, if that was -that happened in K.C., I would have said, yeah (indiscernible), there was a window broken over here. It was done by this guy. By, you know, he didn't intend it, but he did. You know? It was, you know, while I'm around him, if I witnessed an illegal act or hear planning of it, I report.
Q. Okay. And for either of these two you see in front of you, had that -- was that their kind of standing guidance to you?
A. In general, just don't -- you know, don't break the window yourself. You know? Or don't be involved with the planning, any of those kinds of things. And I know that there was error to my understanding, though.

BY
Q. And so you did -- I'll withdraw that. Let me -so, at this point, as you've come through, it's my understanding some other, some other of the folks who were -- had traveled with the Kansas City group also had gone through. Had you given anybody any instructions or directions or encouragement to also come past the barriers?
A. No. And I had even tried to convince -- at that stage, up there where the inauguration thing was, guys that I had seen -- I tried to convince some of them to come back from the front.
Q. Okay. Describe that please.
A. I had walked up to Brian Ashlock and, and I and Chris Kuehne, and I think one other I don't recall, are back over there. Why don't you come back to -I'm not getting into any trouble, you know, blah, blah, blah. You know, it was what he was saying. And I went over to -- then -- and I didn't know where Billy was at the
moment. But, you know, I had returned to the back. When I spotted Billy, I went over and had the same talk with him. And it might have been in reverse order where I spotted Billy first, then went back, then I spotted Chris -- or Ryan Ashlock and did that. But when I went up there to Billy, though, that's when he was like, you know, we started this, you know, and all that.
Q. Do you remember trying to dissuade Chris Kuehne from doing something?
A. Yes, I do. It was beyond the inauguration stage. We're all looking at people going in. They had been going in for a while. And I said to him, I understand if you don't want to go in, you've got a -- what's that B word, when you have like a, no, $P$ word, pension -- you got a pension to worry about, and all that. And, you know, we were still outside at that time because, you know, at that point, I'm like, I'm not going in. And someone said, I hope they're not destroying things of historical significance in there. And I remember me and Chris Kuehne looking at each other. And it was like (sigh), and so you could tell both of us was like, oh, that would suck. And at that point we did enter. But it's because we, you know, if we saw someone trying to rip paintings off the wall or something like that, we were going to stop them.
Q. How do you know that was -- was Chris Kuehne there
when this other individual said, they're going to do something to the antiquities, or --
A. He -- yeah, he was standing there, too, because we both looked at each other and our eyes met. And --
Q. Where did this conversation take place?
A. Where all the inauguration stuff happened as things went down, it was right up there, the top where you could see people going into the back door on the left.
Q. Who was it that mentioned that they might be doing stuff to valuables?
A. I don't recall.
Q. Was anybody else there as part of that conversation, to the best of your knowledge?
A. I don't recall.
Q. Okay.
A. I, I believe briefly, I saw Chrestman walking about up there and stuff, but there was a lot of separation happening. Prior to us going up there, though, I'd been off to the side just looking and watching everything. And at one point -- and this was at the bottom where all the scaffolding was and everything on the left side, and I recall Chris Kuehne nudging me. And when I looked over, he lifted up out of some kind of container, a fire extinguisher, and then he passed it to someone, and I recall watching it go and then vanish into the scaffolding and go
up the stairs, being passed overhead by people.
Q. Okay. Did you ever have any explicit conversation with Chris Kuehne about his motivation for entering the Capitol?
A. No, I just said to him, I understand if you don't want to go, and you've got a pension to worry about. And I walked close and looked a couple of times and I'd seen someone holding up an American First flag through one of the windows, which is the group of -- that $\square$ was head of. He's an online personality. I recall watching people busting through a door and going and then coming out.
Q. And I apologize. I hate to cut you off, but we are --
A. I'm sorry.
Q. No, no, no. You're answering the questions that I asked. I really appreciate it. But we need to try to keep with that. It's harder as we get more tired. I totally understand that. My question is did you ever have an express conversation with Chris Kuehne about his motivation for entering the Capitol?
A. No. I do recall trying to give him an excuse not to need to, though.
Q. Okay.
A. Because I didn't want to.
Q. Did you ever have an express conversation with

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Ryan Ashlock as to his motivation for entering the Capitol?
A. He did not enter the Capitol.
Q. Okay, did you ever have an express conversation with Enrique Colon as to why he entered the Capitol?
A. No, I had become separated from him, and I had actually forgotten what he was wearing and all that. And it took after his arrest and seeing pictures in the Capitol to be like, oh, wait, he was near me at one point. Because I had told them I, I couldn't recall where he was at the time.
Q. And, again, my question is, if you had a conversation about -- with him, about his intent. And I take it the answer is, no?
A. No.
Q. Did you ever have -- we'll skip Mr. Chrestman, because as you said, he expressed to you his motivation.
A. After the fact, yeah.
Q. Did you ever have a conversation with Felicia Konold about her intention in entering the Capitol?
A. No. We had become separated from William Chrestman, who was with her and her brother a lot.
Q. And, again, the question is ever, so my only question is, if ever -- did you ever have a conversation with Cory Konold about his motivation for entering the Capitol?
A. No.
Q. Okay. And did you ever direct anybody or ask -(indiscernible) two ways. Did you ever direct anybody to enter the Capitol Building?
A. No, I --
Q. Did you ever direct anybody to enter the Capitol grounds?
A. No.
Q. Did you ever ask anyone to enter the Capitol Building?
A. No.
Q. Did you ever ask anybody to enter the Capitol grounds?
A. No. I don't believe I would have had the chance to ask. And the very fact that I was, you know, trying to tell Chris Kuehne, hey, I understand if you don't want to go in there, you know, shows that I was not in the point to try and encourage.
Q. So now I'm going to -- you've provided prior descriptions of events that occurred in the Capitol. And so we're actually going to move to afterwards. So after you exit the Capitol, the building itself, what do you do next, or what does the group do next?
A. We were trying to leave and the people coming up the stairs was just too great. So we had to then get on concrete railing and slide down on our butts and utilize, I
believe, three-inch-thick cables to scale down.
Q. Okay, so once you get to -- who are you with at that point?
Q. Felicia Konold, Billy, and all, because we had met up together at the very end before exiting. And we were all trying to leave together, and that's what we had to utilize the scaling down and all that. And a bunch of them went before me. And as I was scaling down, I realized that the protective armor I had over my torso was just way too heavy. And so I released it and dropped half. And then while William Chrestman was getting the rest of it -- I didn't know he was below me -- and I released the other half and it landed right on him. And he was like, man, if that had been you coming down in that, I would have punched you.
Q. So once the group has assembled -- or who did you meet up with after the Capitol, before you then head back to the Airbnb?
A. As we -- after scaling down, I ended up talking to Enrique Colon, and I don't recall if he scaled down with me, but he was telling me about an experience he had where he was separated from us. And he said, while he was in the Capitol, he asked some other guys, hey, are you all Proud Boys? And one guy started looking at him funny and he got into it with them, and they removed a knife from him. And --
Q. Did you witness that incident?
A. No, he told me about it, and he kept telling me about it over and over again, just to make sure that our chapter president all knew his side of the story, and everything. I'm like, look, man, I'm sure it was a misunderstanding. You know? And I recall saying, you know, your colors don't exactly scream Proud Boy, you know? And, you know, tell him, don't worry about it. Things happen. I get it, man. Hey, I don't think you any less, or it's okay. You know, just trying to placate him because he seemed really, really, you know, nervous and upset about that.
Q. And I'm going to try to consolidate. So before you actually take the train back to the Airbnb, who gets -who all gets together?
A. We encountered Ryan at Harry's where, after I had found Ryan , pulled him out of the crowd and we poured water in his eyes, I had told $\square$ hey, it's probably best to get out of here. He goes, okay, we'll go and wait by Harry's, something along those lines. Or I told him to go wait by Harry's, and that's where they went, and that's where we found them.
Q. You know, you mentioned -- when you're describing the crowd -- I need to go back to this. Did $\square$ go into the grounds as well?
A. $\square$ was on the ground as well. He went all the
way up and he was standing at the back of where $I$ had been hanging out, like right when the stairs stopped going up, then it fans out and you have that first middle support thing where you could put, like, cameras and stuff, I guess, for the inauguration and all that.

Q. So he had gone up the stairs by the scaffolding?
A. Yes.
Q. Do you know if he went into the building?
A. He did not. They had -- him and Ryan had already left. And me and Chris Kuehne then moved more to the left of where we were because all the flash bangs and pepper balls going on, we didn't want to be there. So I just kept watching. We watched a steady stream of people going inside and everything.
Q.
 parked, who -- who's in the group at this point?
A. The whole crowd was back together. I don't --
well, yeah, I don't recall how they all did. It was --
Q.
A.
Q. Do you recall anybody specifically from (indiscernible) --
A. Ryan, $\square$ Enrique, Billy, Felicia, and her brother, who then separated elsewhere.
Q. I'm sorry, who's
A. Felicia. I'm -- (indiscernible)

Ryan, me, Enrique, William, Chris Kuehne. I may have mis-said a name.
Q. Okay. And then you said Felicia and her brother were on for a little bit, but you then separated.
A. Yeah, I believe they separated from us and went to a different subway exit location.
Q. Okay. Are there any discussions on the train or is anybody providing any directions as to what to do or not to do at this point?
A. No.
Q. Okay.
A. And I remember someone asked, hey, did you all see what was going on in the Capitol? Like, yeah. Like, I heard the Proud Boys (indiscernible). Oh, no, I watched that first barrier go down. It was definitely regular Trump
supporters, you know, and I'm like, we're not going to take their glory. They did it for sure. But that was still my perception at that time.
Q. Sure. Beyond that, was there any discussion about people being concerned they were in trouble or to measures they should take to protect themselves at that point?
A. I do not recall that kind of talk. I think there was a lot of silence. And, are we at the right stop? Which one are we going to? People being tired.
Q. So, then, arriving back at the Airbnb, what goes on that night?
A. Trying to remember was -- did they order pizza for us to eat on, or was that the night before? But people were pretty tired and everything. And shortly after getting there, I'm up just lying on the bed that I got, sharing a room with William Chrestman.

I arranged to ride with Billy, or William Chrestman, back. And Enrique came into the room and say, so I just want to say again, blah, blah, blah. Like, you'll be fine, dude. It's okay. Don't worry about it. And then I walked downstairs at one point to get a drink, and I think it was a beer at that point, and someone's like, man, Enrique just bailed. I'm like, what? They go, he had family show up and pick him up and he left. I was like, that's not weird at
all. And then that's when Chris Kuehne had mentioned, yeah, he even left his gun in my truck.
Q. Were there -- was there celebration about what had occurred or any discussions about what had occurred or concerns? Anything like that going on?
A. No, I -- if I recall correctly, someone got an official first degree there in the living room. And I recall $\square$-- and he's saying, well, no one has technically done the true vetting process.
Q. And I apologize, you just made an indication that - -- and you did a hand gesture --
A. He was like, can I get, you know, because --
Q. And for the recording, was he -- did you get the impression he was asking whether he could become a Proud Boy?
A. Yeah. Get his first degree at that moment. And I had already communicated with the chapter president and said, hey, $\square$ is wanting to get his first degree. And he said, well, no one's ever truly vetted and we have to run a background check before they can get their first degree and stuff like that. I was like, okay, and I'll let him know that.
Q. But again, could you describe -- was there a general mood of the folks?
A. Tired. Like, everyone was just like, you know --
Q. Did you report back to anybody or did anybody report back to the K.C. president of what occurred?
A. I recall $\square$ saying, hey, are y'all on your way back right now? Said, no, we're leaving in the morning. And he texted back, gay.
Q. Okay. So I want to follow up -- and we're near the end here. And I, again, appreciate everything. During one of your prior meetings, you mentioned that Chrestman had assisted with the Colorado militia guy not getting arrested.
A. That's what he had verbally said to me.
Q. You did not witness that?
A. No, he told me that.
Q. Did you --- and I take it that means you don't have any images or video of that?
A. No, I do not.
Q. Okay. Do you have any other information about anybody else being harmed while at the Capitol, knives, axe handles, other than Chrestman, firearms, anything?
A. Just Enrique admitting that he had a knife on his person and that it was taken by other Proud Boys there. I don't know if it was taken inside the Capitol or right after he exited.
Q. And you mentioned that Chris Kuehne gave you some pepper spray on the morning of the 6th; is that correct?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you ever use it?
A. I did not use it once.
Q. Did you have it with you within the Capitol?
A. Yes, he handed it to me as we were exiting the
trucks to go to the subway station.
Q. On the way to D.C.?
A. Yes.
Q. Yes. Can you -- how big of a can was it?
A. It was one of the small ones that goes on a keychain.
Q. Oh, okay. And you're indicating maybe two or three inches, four inches big.
A. Yes.
Q. Okay.
A. And it never left my pocket.
Q. Okay, do you have any notes or anything documenting any of the conduct that occurred on January 6th?
A. I did not write anything down. I didn't want to have anything that the wrong person might pick up.
Q. All right. Do you still have any of the Telegram chats with Chrestman in which you sent him The Wall Street Journal link?
A. No, that's, you know -- no.
Q. Okay. It's my understanding from the prior meetings you had with the agents that you may have deleted
some of the communications relating to the events of January -- not communications, some of the -- well, communications videos, images. I'll withdraw all of that. Let me ask a fresh question. Have you deleted any images or videos that you took on January 6th?
A. There was one video. I had two in a row, and in one video I'm trying to tell a crowd of people that are encountering police, you don't have to do this. The cops don't have to arrest anyone. You don't have to hurt the cops. Your voice has been heard. It's time to go home. Right before that, I had done one where I videoed people through a skylight pounding on the roof and I wondered, how the hell do they get on the damn roof. Upon exiting, I saw the lifts outside were for like window cleaning or something. I had ended up deleting that, though.
Q. Did you delete the one which -- in which you were telling the people?
A. No.
Q. Okay.
A. I've still got --
Q. You still have that one?
A. Yeah, because that -- my intention was never a negative reason when $I$ entered. And I tried to do some deescalating inside. One instance involving seeing a guy in a tug of war with an officer with a chair. And I walked up
and got real close to put my hands on the shoulders, and he paused and looked like that, and the cop then took and ran away. And he was not happy the cop got away and took and threw the chair as a result.
Q. So let me make -- is this as the door is closing, by chance?
A. Yes. And I then interact with that guy, so to try and stop his little thing with the cop.
Q. So let me be clear then. Have you deleted any image files to the best of your knowledge regarding January 6?
A. That one -- that one video of the skyline --
Q. Image files, like photos.
A. To the best of my knowledge, no.
Q. Okay. And as far as --
A. I thought I'd shared like everything I'd taken, too.
Q. Okay. As far as videos, you said you deleted the one with the skylight. And just out of curiosity, why did you choose to delete that one?
A. I don't recall. I'm wondering, was it space related in my phone, and I thought that, well, this one's really not going to be able to, you know, be useful and all that. It may have been bad quality. I don't recall.
Q. To the best of your knowledge --
A. It had been like within a day or two, as I was scrolling through it all, (indiscernible).
Q. To the best knowledge, have you destroyed any other videos relating January 6?
A. Not that I recall.
Q. Do you have any videos of the group at the Airbnb, or any preplanning videos or pictures?
A. No, just one. I thought I had one picture afterwards with Chris Kuehne where he was laid back on the couch and I laid back with him and I took a selfie of he and I. I'll have to look and see if I still have that.
Q. Have you -- and I think you mentioned you've deleted some communications related to January 6; is that correct?
A. Yeah. Like, if I took a screenshot and I shared it with him, I removed that from my phone and some chats are just no longer in existence.
Q. Have you deleted any contacts from your phone of anybody involved with the events of January 6?
A. No, I think I still have -- I don't know. I'd have to check and see if Billy is still in there. I don't recall, or if me and Billy only communicated via Telegram.
Q. Okay. At this point, is really more of an overarching question, is there anything else regarding the -- recognizing you've done the two prior interviews and
you've provided quite a bit of explanation as to your reasoning to enter the building, is there anything that I forgot to ask you or any other recollections regarding anybody else that was involved in the events of January 6 that you think would be helpful, that you have specific knowledge about?
A. I don't recall off the top of my head. UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: Do you mind if I ask a question about January 5th?
 BY UNIDENTIFIED AGENT:
Q. January 5th, the night before, you mentioned
recall anyone at the Airbnb

A. Someone from showed up, now that you ask -- yes. I don't recall who. I would have stated it back then during a previous conversation, but I don't recall who they were associated with again, off the top of my head. It might have -- $\square$ you know, and old friend from back in the day or something or --
Q. Do you recall anything about him that would describe him or anything that he spoke -- that he talked about on the evening of the 5 th?
A. I think something I would have -- I -- for some reason, I seem to recall saying, was he interested in joining the Proud Boys? But I didn't get an answer and all that. But that's just 'cause I was trying to figure out, well, who's this guy. You know, but I don't, I don't even think I had any real direct conversation with the guy, other than, hey, or something like that. I had actually forgotten about him.

Q. Do you recall him making any statements about engaging in any violence?
A. I do not recall. I don't remember.
Q. Do you recall anybody else coming by from any other states, possibly?
A. Just $\square$ and the $\square$ people.
